

#### What do I need to use Canvas?

- · Computer with Internet access
- The latest version of Chrome, Firefox, Internet Explorer or Safari
- · iConnect Login (ID and password)

#### Getting an iConnect Login:

- Log on to stchas.edu, click on SCC Connection (If you don't see SCC Connection click on Student Tools, then click on SCC CONNECTION.)
- Click on Activate My Login.
- Enter the required information and create your password to get your login ID.
- Use your login ID and the password you created to access Canvas, SCC Connection and wireless Internet.

#### **Logging Into Canvas:**

- Type stchas.instructure.com in the address bar at the top
  of the browser window, or click on the Canvas link in the
  menu bar at the top of the SCC home page.
- Type your iConnect user name and password into the Canvas login window.
- Once inside Canvas, locate the "Courses" menu in the global navigation bar at the top of the window.
- Pull down the drop down menu and select the desired course under "My Courses."


#### My Course is Not Here, What Should I do?
